

Desert Rose is native to the Sahel region of Africa. Look for it in the succulent garden and near the Main House.



Calabash Tree, Roxburgh Fig Crescentia cujete, Ficus auriculata

Both the calabash tree (left) and the Roxburgh fig (right) flower and fruit right on the trunk! A fig is actually an inverted flower that blooms on the inside of the fleshy pod.



Hura crepitans

The dynamite tree south of the parking lot grows fruit that explodes when ripe, scattering the seeds over a great distance.
